FORSYTH COUNTY ENVIRONMENTAL AFFAIRS

A burning permit must be obtained from the Environmental Affairs Department by any person or organization wishing to intentionally burn a facility for the purpose of fire training as required in Subchapter 3D, Section .1903(d) of the Forsyth County Air Quality Control Ordinance and Technical Code.

The National Emissions Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants (USEPA; 40 CFR Part 61) requires that each facility be inspected for the presence of asbestos containing materials and that all asbestos materials be removed prior to burning.

The State of North Carolina requires that these surveys/inspections be performed by an “accredited” inspector.

A demolition permit from Environmental Affairs is also required for intentionally burned facilities that are commercially owned.

APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS

1. Pertains to Fire Department conducting and responsible for training activities.
2. Address and description of facility to be burned (ex.: single family house, shed, etc.).
3. Name and address of owner of facility to be burned.
4. Requested dates for permit to be in effect with in which time burning will take place. Permits are generally issued for 30-60 days and must be extended if burning does not take place as planned.
5. Tentative Scheduled Burning Date is the day(s) actual burning of the facility is planned to take place within the Permit period.
6. Sampling suspect asbestos material is the responsibility of the Fire Departments applying for the permit.

Suspect material not sampled must be removed prior to burning by the Fire Department or the owner of the facility.
7. List materials that will be removed from the facility by the owner or the Fire Department. Include suspect asbestos materials and materials required to be removed by Fire Codes.
8. Describe activities planned, then sign and date applications.
