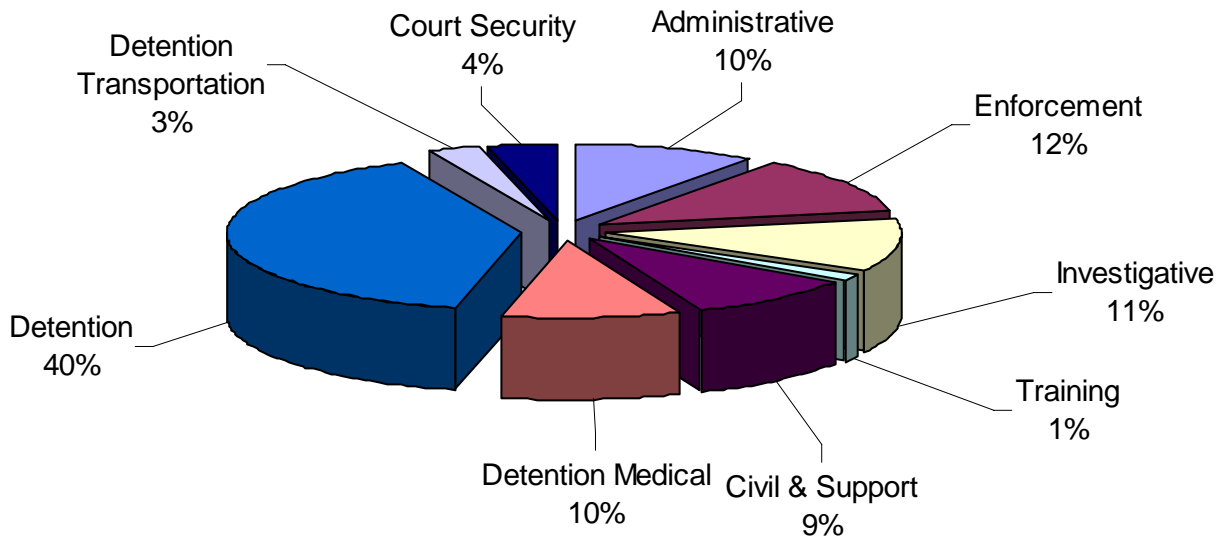

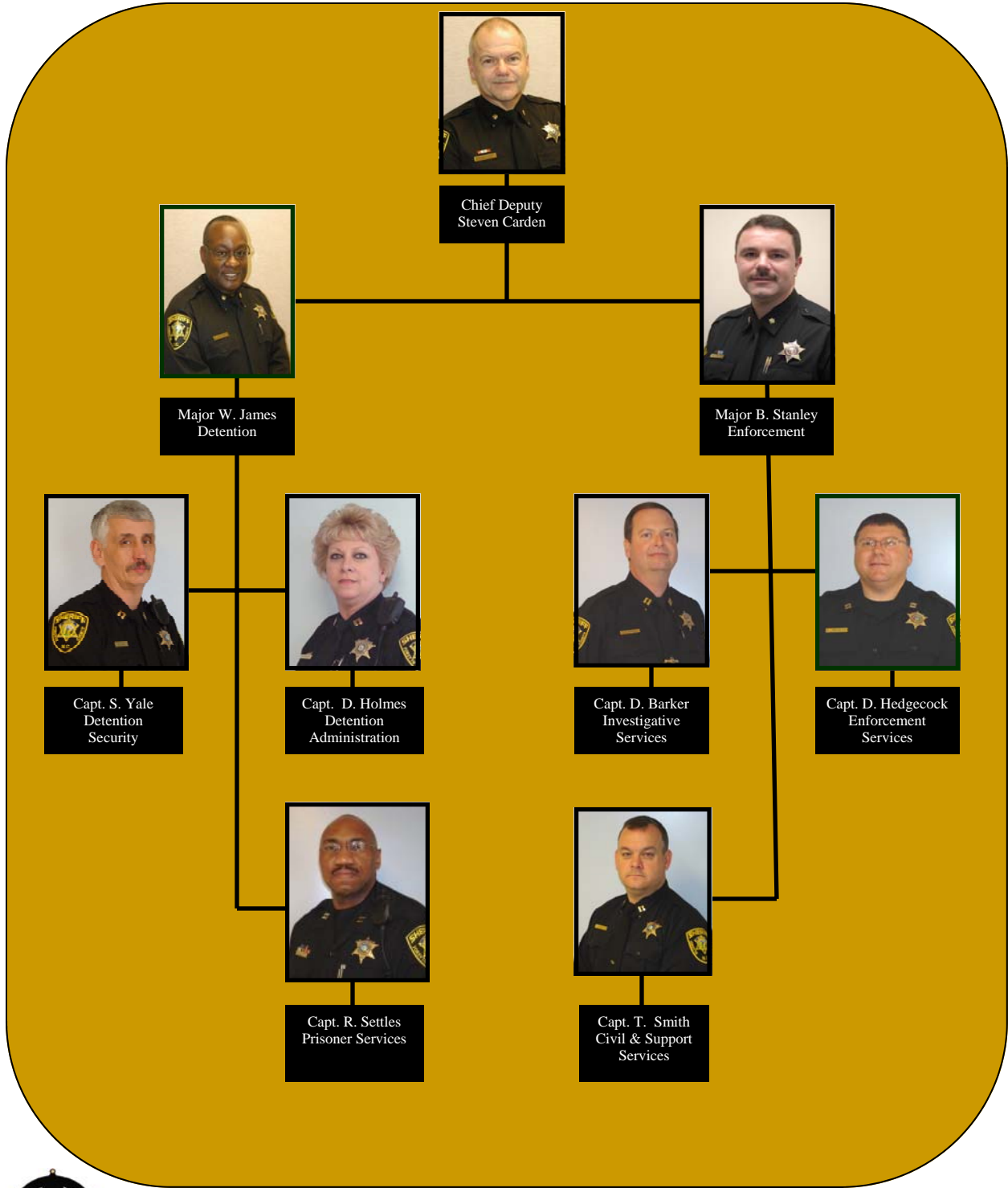

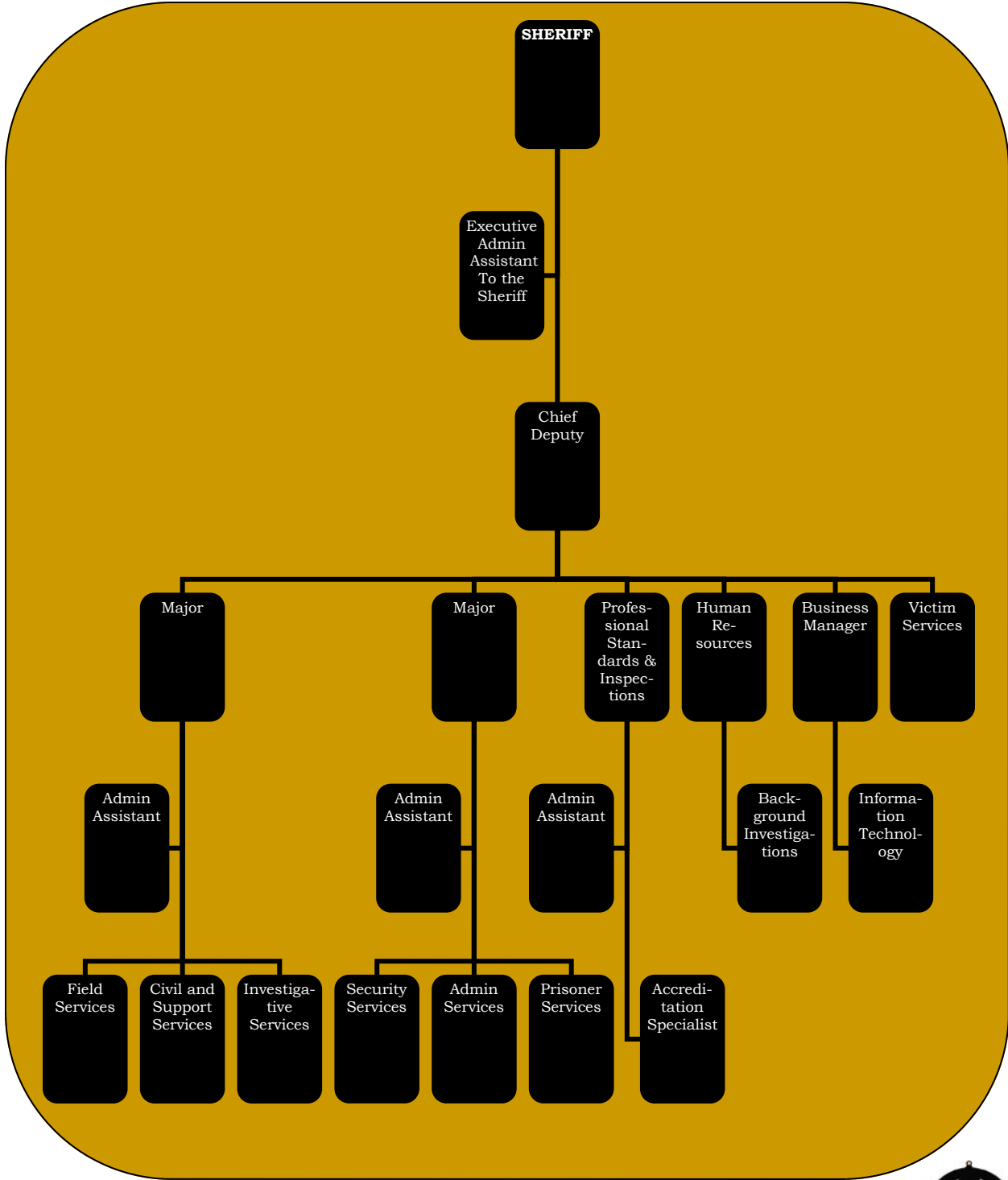
Sheriff's Office Adopted Expenditure Budget Breakdown

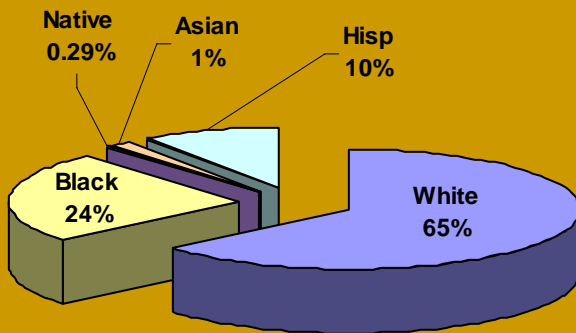

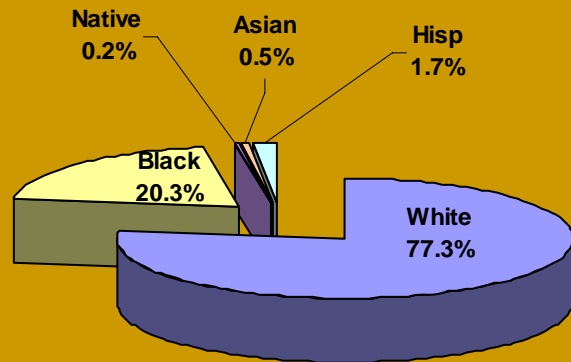

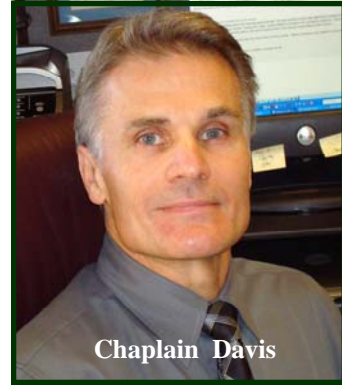




## VICTIM SERVICES

### Chaplain/Victim Services

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office is fortunate to have a full-time Chaplain to assist victims of violent crime and other trauma in the community. The Chaplain also provides confidential support to officers and their families in times of joy and sadness. He is often called to respond to the scene of a crisis, homes, workplaces, and hospitals on a 24 hour basis. Chaplain Davis's activities for 2007 totaled approximately 550 cases and contact with 2100+ individuals.

## NEW HORIZONS

### **CAD (COMPUTER AIDED DISPATCH)**

Communicators are able to enter and track calls, send calls directly to the cars and locate department cars with AVL (AUTOMATIC VEHICLE LOCATORS).



### **SAN (STORAGE AREA NETWORK)**



The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office has two Storage Area Network (SAN) devices, one located at the Sheriff's Office and one located at the Winston-Salem Police Department. The SANs are fault tolerant, redundant hard drive arrays and they contain the data for RMS, JMS, WSPD and FCSO CADs, and soon to be e-mail and file sharing. Each SAN synchronously copies all data written to the other device, ensuring that if one device is destroyed, data is preserved.

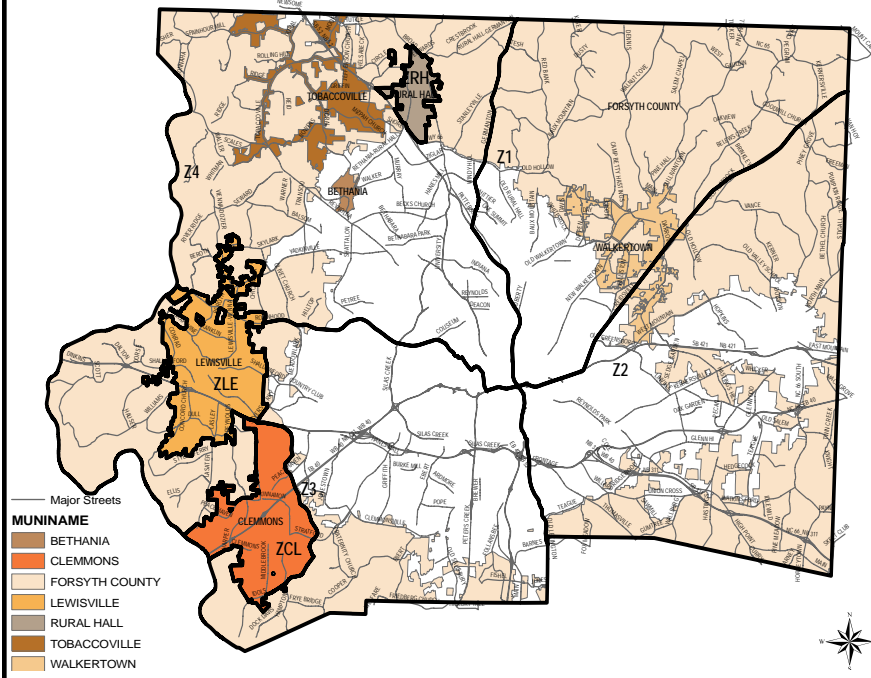
### **MCT (MOBILE COMPUTER TERMINAL) & MFR (MOBILE FIELD REPORTING)**

Officers are now able to process their reports from their patrol cars and access reports as well as share information with other officers.



# ENFORCEMENT DIVISION

Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Area



Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Patrol answers citizen calls from approximately 265 square miles and a population of approximately 113,503. Patrol is comprised of 72 Deputies, Including Community Policing officers (14), and 2 ACE Team members. This equals about .28 officer per square mile and .634 officers per capita.

## SPECIAL TEAMS

### Marine Patrol

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Marine Patrol consists of three vessels obtained through the government's Law Enforcement Support Services division at no cost to the county. These three vessels are used to patrol Belews Lake, performing law enforcement functions as well as search and rescue/recovery missions. The smaller vessels can also be used on the Yadkin River and smaller inland lakes and ponds.



### K-9

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office K-9 Unit is comprised of 10 highly trained canines and their handlers. Our canines consist of German Shepherds, Belgian Malinois, Labrador Retrievers and Border Collies. Canine officers are used to track and apprehend criminals and to search for lost persons in our community as well as assisting other agencies. One K9 officer is assigned to SRO's for use in schools and one to Courtroom Services.



### Citizens Patrol

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Citizens Patrol is a team of trained volunteers who enhance vital crime prevention services and community awareness through protective law enforcement principles. The Citizens Patrol function as additional eyes and ears of the Sheriff's Office and perform a wide range of functions such as traffic control, assisting with courthouse duties, fingerprinting, serving subpoenas, and many other special assignments. Volunteers serve a minimum of 15 hours per month.

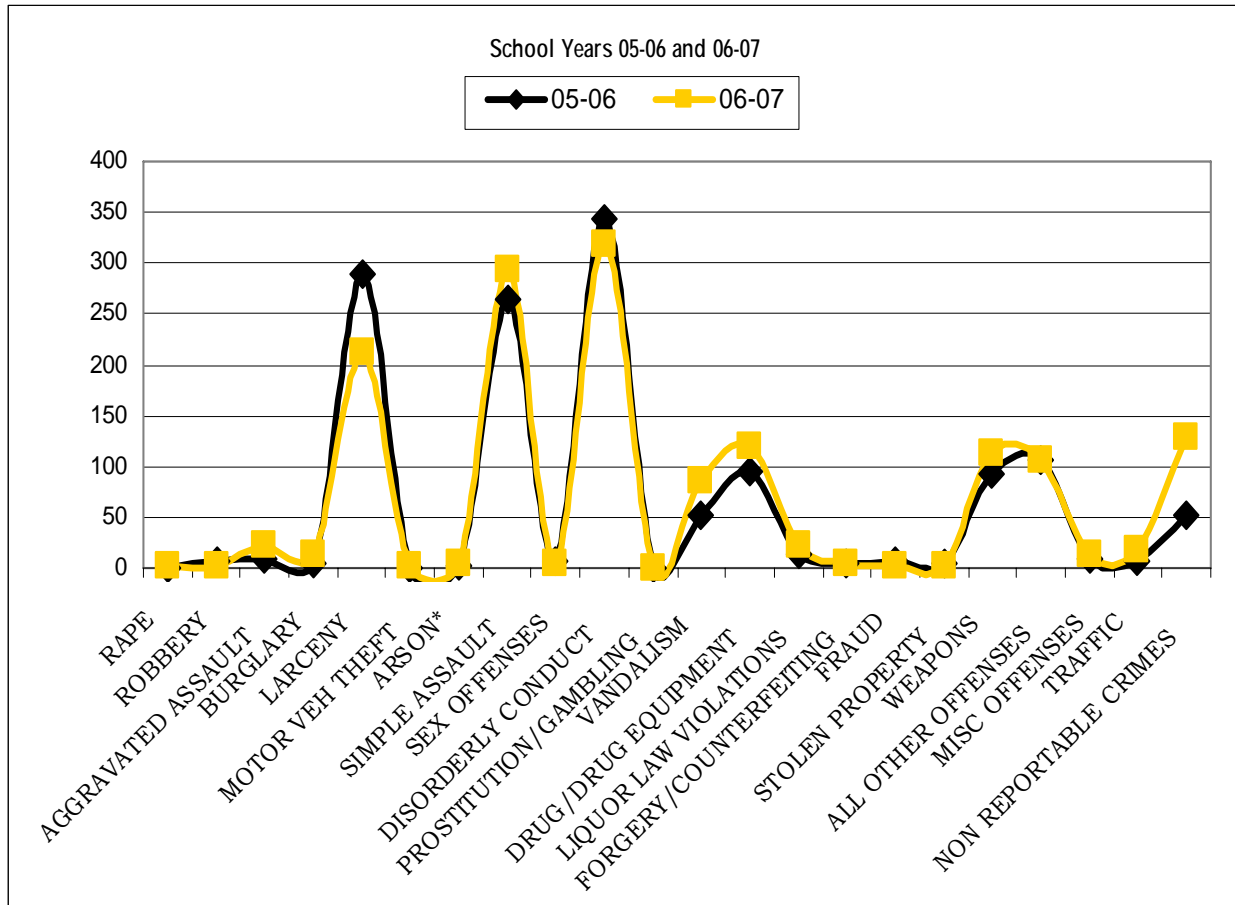

# INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES

CSI

On November 14, 2006, the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Crime Laboratory applied for ASCLD/LAB accreditation. This has been a year long process for the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Crime Laboratory. ASCLD/LAB is the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors Laboratory Accreditation Board. ASCLD/LAB Accreditation is a voluntary program "in which any crime laboratory may participate to demonstrate that its management, personnel, operational and technical procedures, equipment, and physical facilities meet established standards."

"Accreditation is one part of a laboratory's quality assurance program which should also include proficiency testing, continuing education, and other programs to help the laboratory provide better overall service to the criminal justice system."

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Crime Laboratory's application was accepted by ASCLD/LAB on December 14, 2006. The inspection team inspected the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Crime Laboratory on April 16 and April 17, 2007. The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office achieved accreditation on August 10, 2007.

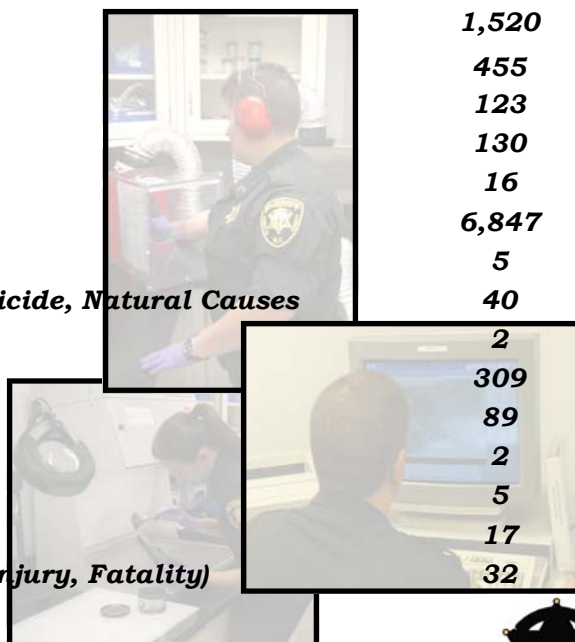
The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Crime Laboratory is the first sheriff's office in North Carolina to achieve accreditation through ASCLD/LAB. There are only six other ASCLD/LAB accredited laboratories in North Carolina. Both SBI laboratories are accredited through ASCLD/LAB as is the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department lab. The remaining three accredited ASCLD/LAB laboratories are private labs.'

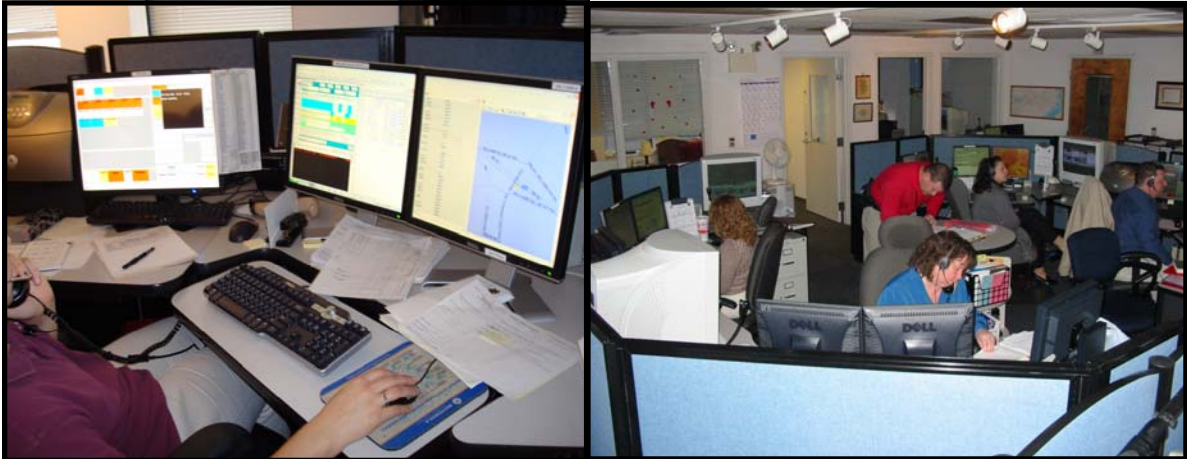

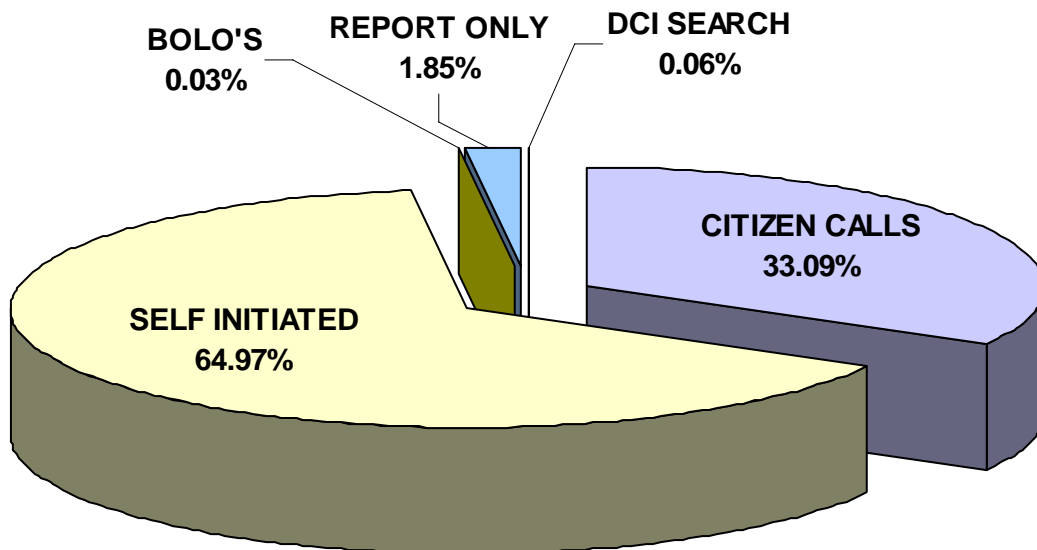

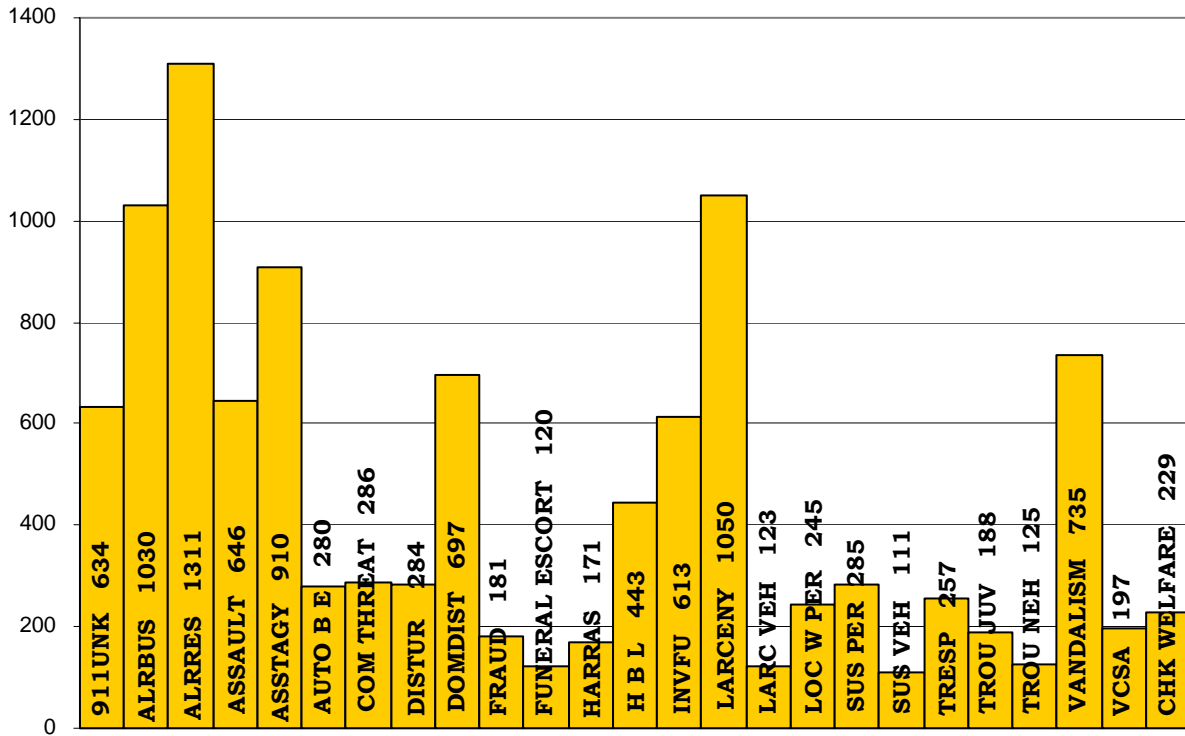


The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Communications Center received 72,947 Calls for Service in 2007. Communicators served 7,449 subpoenas.



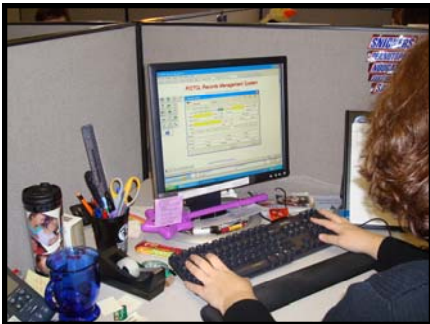

mission is to respond to emergencies in the county, either natural or man made. This unit consists of specialty vehicles.



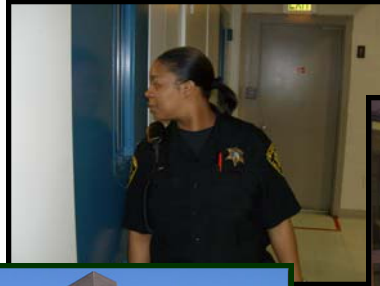
### Mobile Command Unit (MCU)

# DETENTION SERVICES

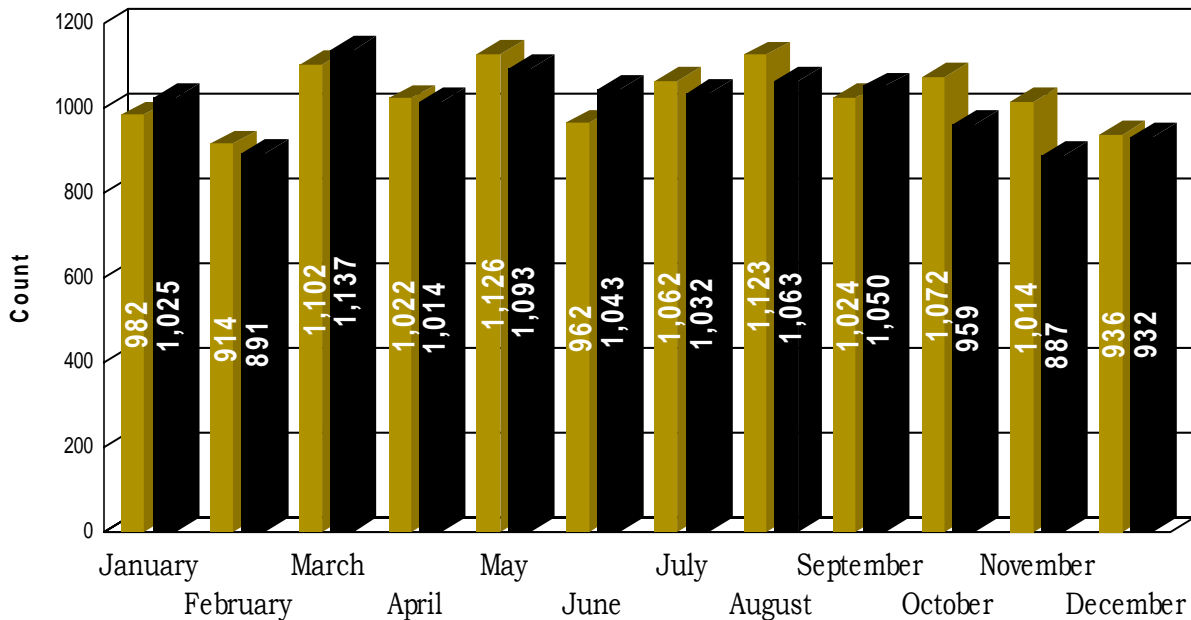
The Forsyth County Law Enforcement Detention Center is an adult maximum security 400,000 square feet, eleven story twin tower structure containing 735 modular steel cells with bed capacity of 1,016, housing both males and females.

The Transportation Division's primary responsibility is to transport prisoners throughout the state. Often, prisoners need specialized medical treatment or mental health evaluations as directed by the commander of that division as well as transportation to other facilities.





## COURT SERVICES



### **Court Security Unit**

The primary mission of the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Courtroom Division is to maintain an orderly, safe, and secure court for the 21st Judicial District of North Carolina. Duties of the Deputy Sheriffs assigned to the Courtroom Division encompass the areas around the courtrooms as well as inside the courtrooms. The courtroom division presently serves sixteen Courts at this time, plus the Grand Jury, one court in the City of Kernersville, (Wednesdays Only) and five of the courts are Superior Court and includes security for jurors.

Deputy Sheriffs assigned to the Courtroom Division ensures order, safety and security of court officials such as judges, district attorneys, clerks of court, court reporters, court administrators, attorneys, public defenders, jurors, defendants, witnesses, as well as the general public in attendance of court proceedings.

Courtroom Security transported 10,175 inmates to court and took 1,828 new persons into custody in 2007. Total number of persons transported to the Law Enforcement Detention Center was 11,666.

Deputies assigned to the court services division staffed 2,858 court sessions.



# DETENTION SECURITY THREAT GROUP



The Forsyth County Law Enforcement Detention Centers Security Threat Group Unit is comprised of 16 detention officers that assist in identifying inmates that may cause a threat to the facilities daily operations. Officers are trained in several areas of gang identification, i.e. Hand signs, graffiti, and decoding information.



# DETENTION SPECIAL RESPONSE TEAM

There are fifty detention officers who are currently members of the Detention Center's Special Response Team (SRT). Officers receive forty hours of specialized training before becoming a member of SRT. Officers are trained to respond to incidents inside the facility such as fights, riots, facility shakedowns and medical incidents. SRT members train an additional 60 hours during the year.



## DAY REPORTING & PRETRIAL

The **Day Reporting Center** was established in 1996 and is operated by the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office. The program is designed to enhance probation and the pre-trial release program. The accepts sentenced offenders (male and female) who receive an intermediate sanction and selected pre-trial offenders, who are in need of one or all of the following: substance abuse counseling, (for sentenced offenders only) employment, education, life skills classes, cognitive behavior intervention classes, and vocational and/or intense monitoring. The FCDRC works with the pre-trial release program by providing an enhanced monitoring element to select inmates released into the pre-trial release program.

Offenders are closely monitored by interacting in a structured environment that provides offenders access to drug and alcohol treatment, health education, vocational and educational training and cognitive behavior classes. Individuals must account for their time 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Accountability is accomplished through the use of in person reporting requirements and random field checks.

Sentenced offenders are required to report daily and are placed on a 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. curfew. Individuals found in violation of the rules are terminated from the program and therefore are in direct violation of their probation sentence. These individuals are placed in custody and returned to court. FCDRC partners with several agencies to assist in providing training outreach programs including Forsyth Tech, North Carolina Cooperative Extension, Imprints, Treatment Accountability for Safer Communities, and Substance Abuse Treatment.

We are presently serving 84 sentenced offenders that would be otherwise incarcerated. We also serve a population of 134 child support / pre-trial clients.

Staff includes: Program Director, 2 Case Managers and Substance Abuse Counselor.

The **Pretrial Release Section** was established in 1995 to monitor the jail population to determine those defendants who may be eligible for pretrial release from jail.

Monday through Friday we attend defendants First Appearance Court to develop a pretrial report, and prepare pretrial release contracts at the instruction of the District Court Judges. We provide assistance to the District Attorneys in screening the pretrial population to reduce defendants stay in jail.

Defendants are interviewed and screened for accurate information. As a service to the court, defendants are objectively assessed for likelihood to appear for court. Criminal records are verified, as well as personal information about employment, residence, family ties, etc. before recommendations are made to the court regarding release. In 2007 we recommended 425 defendants for pretrial release contracts. Thus far in 2008, we have recommended 137 defendants, which is above average for the first three months.

Programs such as Pretrial release, Electronic House Arrest (EHA) and Day Reporting Center (DCR) provides more supervision to defendants awaiting trial, as apposed to those defendants being released on their own recognizance or on a secured bond.

We are presently operating with 3 pretrial release specialists and a pretrial release manager at the Detention Center.

In 2007 we recommended 425 defendants for pretrial release contracts.



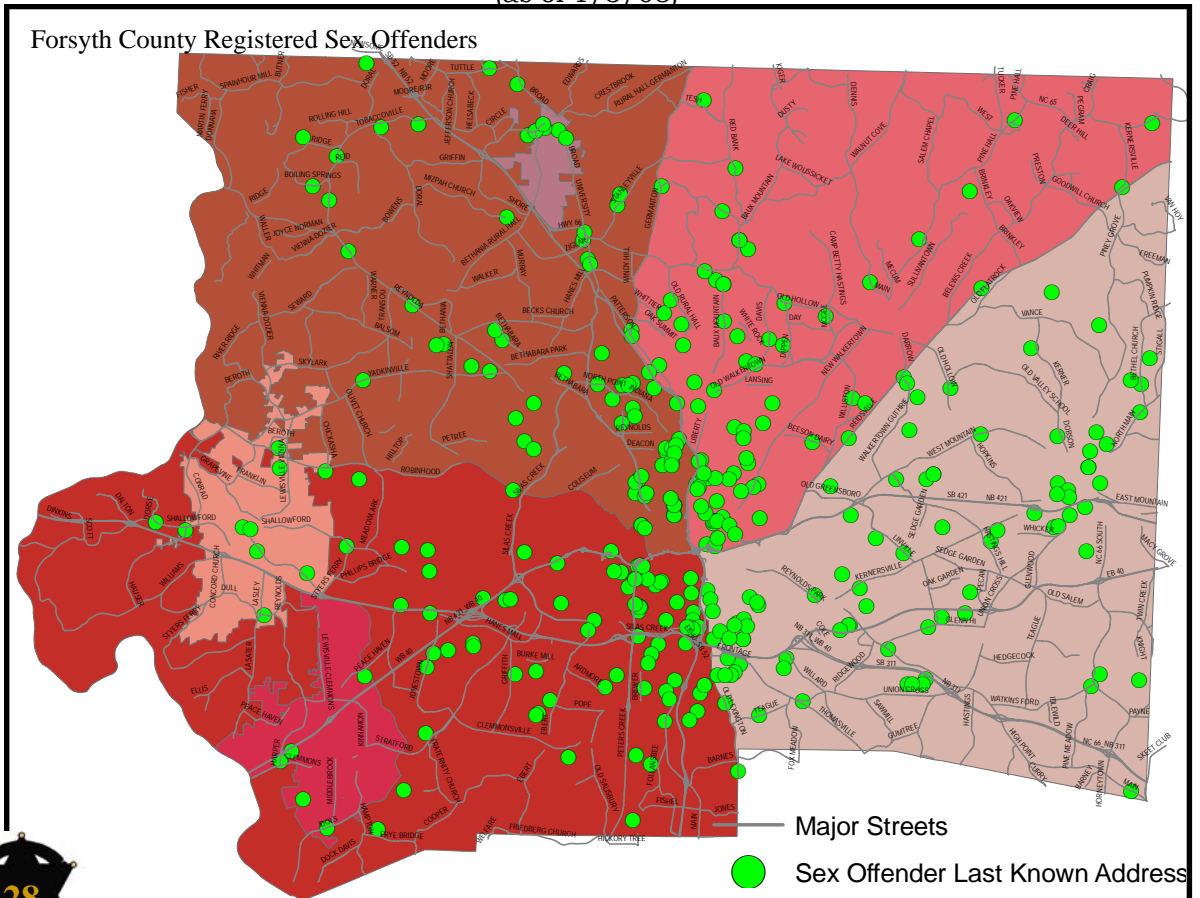
# SEX OFFENDER REGISTRATION

Convicted Sex Offenders will at regular intervals during the year verify their address by appearing in person at the registering sheriff's office and providing documentation of that address. The sheriff may at anytime attempt to further verify the address of the offender. The file and the information is forwarded to the State Bureau of Investigations and kept current and accurate. The Sheriff's Office will also investigate reported and suspected violations of the registration laws and prosecute the violators in cooperation with the Forsyth County District Attorney's Office. The sheriff's office acts as a liaison between this county and other law enforcement agencies which may request information on registered offenders. Information will also be provided to the general public concerning the offenders and the applicable laws involving sex offenders as requested, in compliance with public information only.

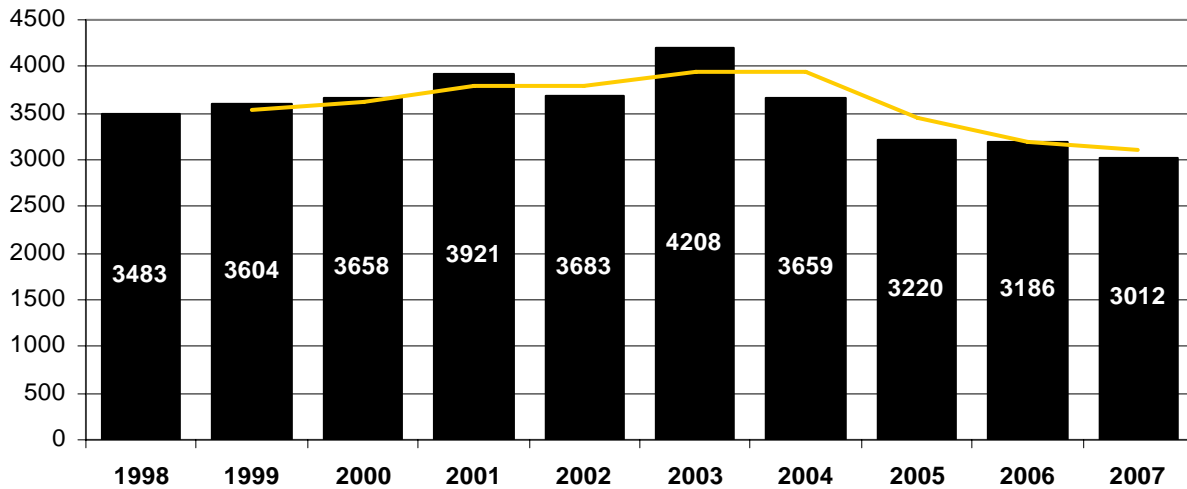

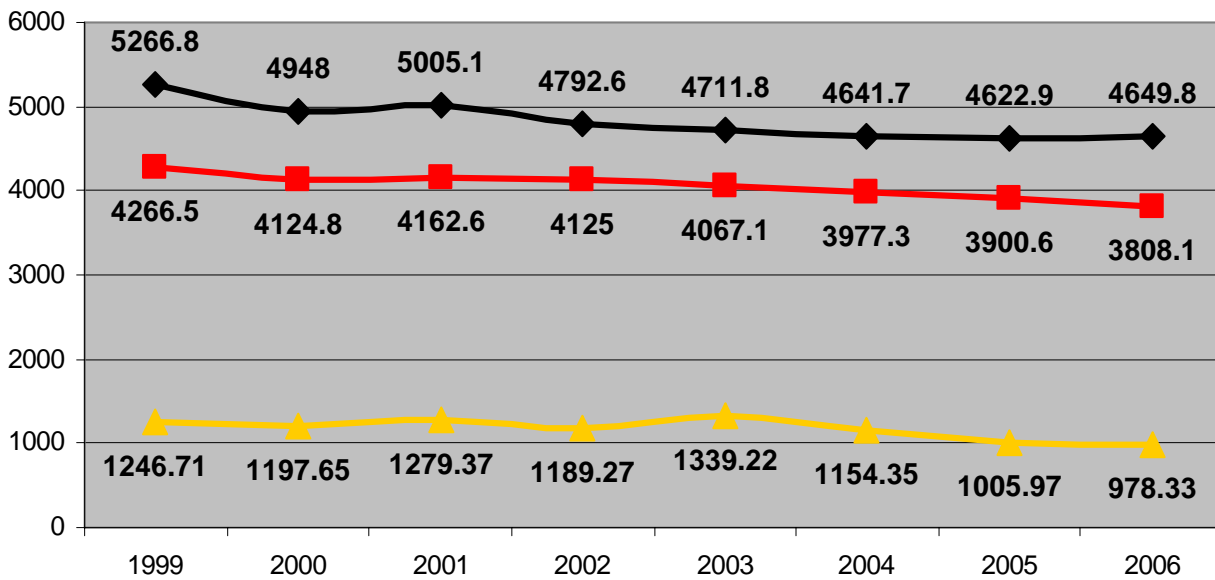

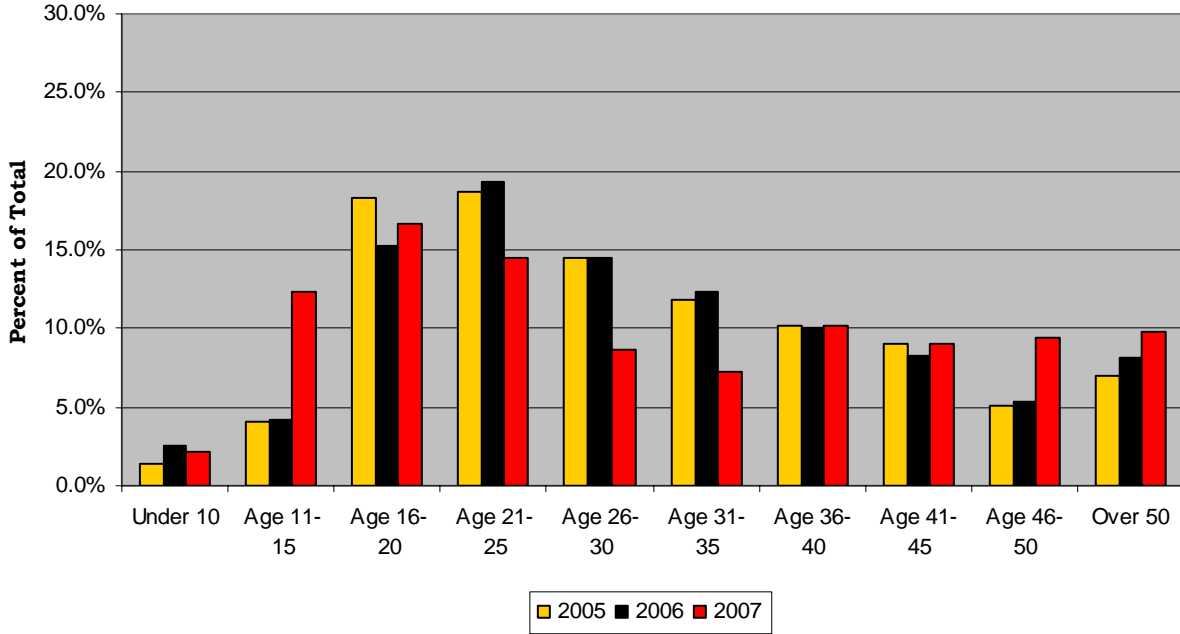

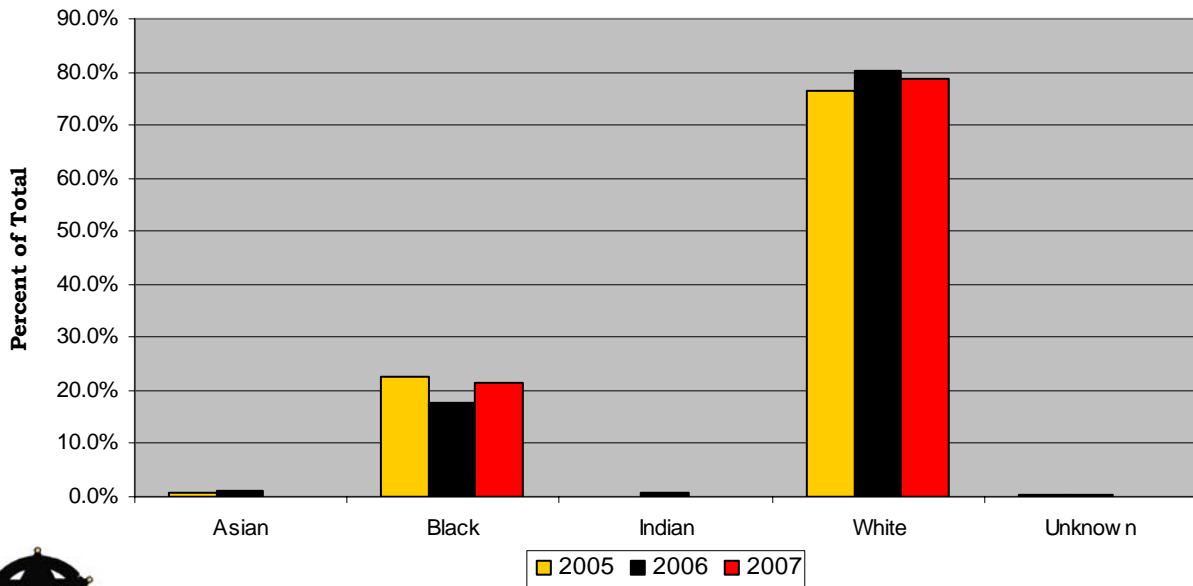

**Ratio of Identified Violent Crime Victims by Race**



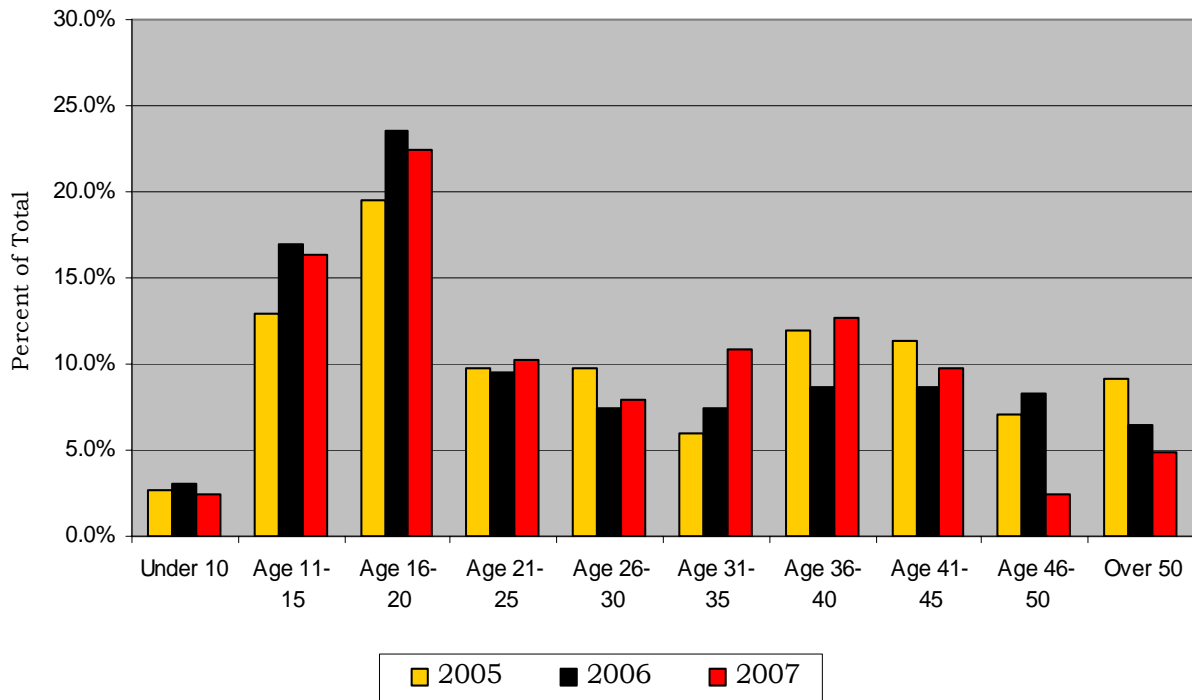

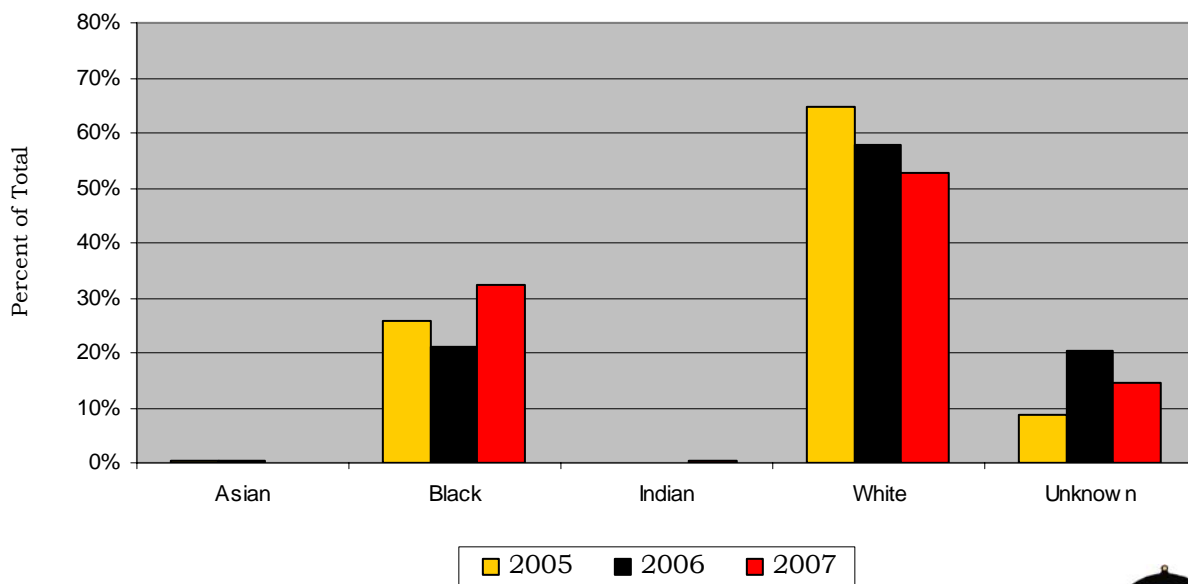

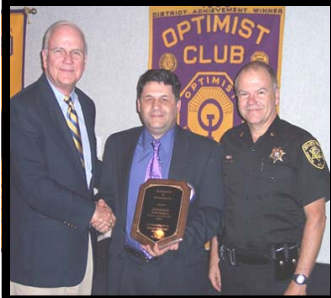

# ACHIEVEMENTS



In September, **Lt. Priscilla Trentham** graduated from the FBI National Academy program at Quantico, Virginia. In March of 2007, the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office added 4 new K-9's to its K-9 unit. **Hero** was one of the new K-9 recruits, he is a Belgian Malinois and his handler, is **Deputy Lane Koontz**. Following an intensive 6 week training program, Deputy Koontz and K-9 Deputy Hero hit the streets. On July 18th, 2007, detectives with the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office served a search warrant in western Forsyth County. Deputy Koontz and K-9 Deputy Hero seized 526 grams of cocaine with a street value of over \$210,000, \$97,000 in U.S. currency and a stolen firearm. Not only was this a significant drug seizure, but the cash alone covered the Sheriff's Office \$60,000 investment in the 4 new dogs and their training.

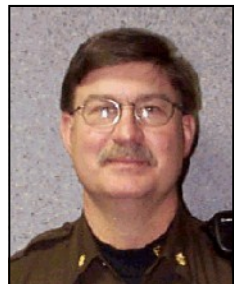
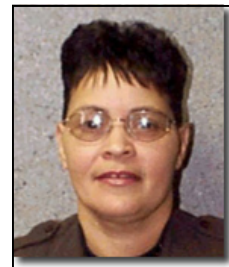

**Sergeant James Milton Johnson**  
***November 11, 2004***

While attempting to subdue a neighbor who had started shooting people in the neighborhood, Reserve Sergeant Johnson was shot and killed. During the same incident another deputy was wounded and two civilians were killed by the gunman.

***May 30, 1975***

A reserve officer, attempting to apprehend a suspect who had shot and killed Deputy Wayne Gaither of the Davie County Sheriff's Office, was shot and killed. The suspect had been cornered in a small convenience store and was exchanging shots with the officers. Captain Renigar was shot by the suspect as he stood up from his covered position to warn a couple that had pulled into the parking lot of the store not knowing



**Deputy Sheriff Ernest Wilson Walters**  
***February 23, 1966***

While serving a civil process, Deputy Walters asked the suspect to secure her dog to prevent it from getting out of the house. The woman retrieved a shotgun and shot Deputy Walters.



**Deputy Sheriff T. N. Westmoreland**  
***April 26, 1950***

Deputy Westmoreland was stabbed to death while making an arrest.



**Deputy Sheriff Linder Newsome**  
***February 23, 1929***

While in pursuit of a vehicle occupied by thieves, Deputy Newsome's patrol car crashed.
